## Introduction from Mark Cunningham, Chairman and Zillah Bingley, CEO

When serious illness affects a child, family life is turned upside down and time becomes more precious than ever. The vital practical and emotional support provided by our expert Family Support Workers makes all the difference, and is provided at no cost to families.

Last year, we supported 2,379 families, and our presence in the children's palliative care sector grew stronger day by day. Our income increased by 9% and supporters raised an incredible £4.6 million. We are enormously grateful to them, as this allowed us to continue to grow and provide much needed family support.

We also said goodbye and thank you to Heather Wood who retired after 28 years with Rainbow Trust and 17 years as Chief Executive. Heather was passionate about supporting families and worked tirelessly to increase the number of families we help.

This impact report is about the difference our supporters, volunteers and staff make to thousands of families' lives. Together we enabled families to make the most of the time they have, one day at a time.

MORE TIME FOR FAMILIES

This year we supported more families than ever before through our nine care teams.

Expansion of our service onto the Isle of Wight, the effective management of family caseloads and the increased number of volunteers working alongside our Family Support Workers all contributed to our being able to support more families.

Our pilot project with Jessie May Trust, to provide families with volunteers to give practical support around the house, recruited and successfully paired volunteers with 23 families.

Across the organisation. 430 volunteers donated 28.034 hours of their time and expertise to Rainbow Trust. This is an enormous contribution. without which we could not achieve as much as we have

To raise the profile of the work we do, and to highlight how much our support impacts communities, we published 'Hidden Savings', a report which sets out how Rainbow Trust saves the health and social care system money. We shared the report with supporters, MPs and within the sector, and it has been verv well received. 3 Central London based Family Support Worker, Diana with Sherray and Ezekiel



Being told that your child is so seriously ill that they might die is something no parent ever wishes to hear. Nobody knows how they would react or how they would cope. And in this new world in which families find themselves, everyday life has to continue.

Brothers and sisters still need to go to school, shopping still needs to be done, bills still need to be paid and the home still has to be maintained.

Rainbow Trust pairs each family with a dedicated Family Support Worker who becomes a trusted and constant person to help them face, and make the most of, each new day. Having someone to turn to in the chaos of a child's life threatening or terminal illness can, and does, make a huge difference to how a family manages. We support families in their home, in the hospital and in the community. We spend time with siblings helping them maintain some kind of normality by ensuring they can get to and from school, that homework is done and that they have the support they need. We also help with transport to hospital, ensuring appointments are met and families don't have to rely on public transport. For children prone to infection, being on public transport may not be possible due to their already compromised immune system.

We are there for the whole family wherever and whenever they need us. So many services withdraw when a child dies but Rainbow Trust supports the whole family for as long as they need.

When I was at home with Miracle, Diana took Sherray to the park and Ezekiel to nursery – it made a big difference having that kind of help, without it I think my other children would have suffered more. Without her help, my children would not get that one-to-one attention. **99**

To measure the impact Family Support Workers have on families' lives, each family is asked to score themselves in outcome areas to gauge the effect of our service.

This year we measured outcomes from a number of Rainbow Trust families and asked them to review the impact of our service from referral to six months, and from families who have been supported by Rainbow Trust for more than six months.

The following pages show the difference we have made to five families this year.

The figures below show the percentage of families reporting an improvement in their ability to cope in these outcome areas.



**Quality of life:** being able to plan family activities at home, or to have time outside the home together



**Quality time:** enjoying time together as a family, and communicating well together



**Stability and confidence:** able to have difficult conversations with medical professionals and manage practical demands of daily chores



Managing stress: feeling emotionally stable within their situation



**Economic wellbeing:** the ability to pay bills and cope with the costs of travelling to appointments.

## IMPROVING FAMILIES' QUALITY OF LIFE

Samuel from Essex was born with a severe heart condition and needed monitoring 24 hours a day. His heart could stop with any kind of stress. Vicky and Rick, his parents, could never leave him alone so, as well as looking after their other two children, the couple was left struggling to have any semblance of normal life.

Family Support Worker, Sarah, supports the family. From transport to hospital appointments, support in hospital during Samuel's open-heart surgery, playing with Daisy and Betsy at home or taking them out for the day and giving respite for Mum when things have just got too much, Sarah is there for them.

Without Sarah, I'd have no kind of break. We take life one day at a time but having her support means we can have days out or I can do chores knowing Sarah is looking after Samuel as well as I would.

## RESTORING STABILITY AND CONFIDENCE

After Jayne's two young daughters, Alisha and Ashleigh, died of Batten's Disease in the space of two years, she and Lucy, her elder daughter, struggled to manage. The death of one child was hard enough, but going through it a second time took its toll on Jayne and she struggled with everyday life.

When Ashleigh passed away in May 2014, I relied on Marlene. I lost so much confidence. Marlene took me to tribute days to light a candle for Ashleigh. Just having someone there made me feel that I was not going mad.

## QUALITY TIME TOGETHER

Beccy and Godfrey's eldest son, Henry, was born with a condition which left him with severe kidney and bladder damage and he is fed through a tube in his stomach.

Henry will need a kidney transplant in the future. Godfrey is donating one of his kidneys and when the time comes, Godfrey will be in hospital for a while and the family won't be able to spend much time together. Nicki, a Surrey based Family Support Worker, will help Beccy juggle spending time at the hospital with Henry and Godfrey and taking care of Thomas. Nicki has been spending time with the family getting to know the boys so that when Henry has his transplant, the boys will feel comfortable with Nicki.



This summer we went to a Rainbow Trust day out and met other families. That was fun and so good to meet families in similar situations to us. We also went to a Christmas pantomime; the boys absolutely loved it. It's so great for us to have some fun together.

# SUPPORTING FAMILIES TO MANAGE THEIR STRESS

Zia was born 10 weeks prematurely and weighed just 2.3lbs. Dawn, her mum, was overjoyed but felt overwhelmed with Zia's major health issues. She found it difficult to bond with Zia and didn't feel confident taking care of her as Zia was so ill.

Dawn self-referred to Rainbow Trust as she knew she needed help. Her Family Support Worker spent time with Zia in the neonatal unit and supported Dawn emotionally. Dawn was able to talk about her fears and helped her find the confidence to look after her precious baby girl.

I found it so hard, I wanted to put Zia into care as I didn't think I could cope. Having Marlene, our Family Support Worker, there for emotional support made all the difference. I can't put into words how much she has helped me.

## IMPROVING FAMILIES' ECONOMIC WELLBEING

Kia was seven when she was diagnosed with a rare genetic disorder. Carol and Dean, her parents, struggled to manage caring for her and Brayden, her older brother.

Carol had to give up her job and eventually their home, as they could not keep up with the payments after spending more than £90 a week travelling to Newcastle for hospital visits. Carol, their Family Support Worker, started supporting the family and took mum and Kia to the hospital, saving them train fares, which meant they could afford to keep their rented home warm in the winter. This reduced the huge financial strain on the family and they could focus on taking care of their children. Carol also spent time with the family in the home, giving mum a break and Brayden some fun.

Carol signposted me to benefits that we were entitled to which helped us manage our bills. We didn't have to spend it all on travel and that meant we were under so much less financial strain.

### **CORPORATES**

### **EVENTS**

Our loyal committees, friends and ambassadors joined us at our festive Carol Concert at St Paul's Church in Knightsbridge, Trust in Fashion at the Savoy and at Sandown Racecourse for our Race Night raising over £275,000.

Our amazing supporters climbed, ran, jumped, cycled, walked and swam to raise an incredible £525,000. Our 47 strong London Marathon team raised over £128,000 and Hanover Dairies in Tyne and Wear raised over £16,000 with their Highland Hike.

### INDIVIDUALS

This year, 5,100 donors supported our campaign and appeals, made a regular donation or signed up to Sponsor a Family Support Worker. We also launched a new lottery with a chance to win £25,000 each week.

We also worked hard to make sure that all our supporters had the best possible experience of fundraising for us and that we protected their personal data and privacy.

### TRUSTS AND FOUNDATIONS

We welcomed new trusts and foundations generously supporting us for the first time this year including The Kentown Wizard Foundation, The Linbury Trust and The Rank Foundation. Oak Foundation, Garfield Weston Foundation, The Ingram Trust, The 29th May 1961 Charitable Trust and The Zochonis Charitable Trust also made generous donations.

The Big Lottery Fund's support for the Me Too! project ensured that more than 150 young sibling carers had someone to talk to, outings away from the pressures of home life and their brother or sister's illness, as well as support to get to school and help with homework.

### VOLUNTEERS

This year our amazing volunteers donated 28,034 hours of their time so that families we support could make the most of theirs. More than 430 volunteers gave their time in our shops, offices, out in the community, at our events and alongside our Family Support workers. Helen Huckle, our longest serving volunteer of 30 years, continued to support Rainbow Trust by shaving her hair and raised over £500.
