Introduction from Mark Cunningham, Chairman and Zillah Bingley, CEO

This impact report shows the difference that our supporters, volunteers and staff make to thousands of families' lives.

When serious illness affects a child, family life is turned upside down and time becomes more precious than ever. Together we help families with a seriously ill child make the most of time in all kinds of ways, wherever and whenever they need it.

Last year we were proud to support more families than ever before, meeting an increased demand whilst maintaining a high-quality service. Our annual service audit showed that 82% of families rated our overall service as excellent at 9 or 10 out of 10.

98% of children said they liked Rainbow Trust visiting and 100% felt that Rainbow Trust kept them safe. Feedback such as this confirms that parents value the quality of the support they receive from us and that for children, a Rainbow Trust Family Support Worker is a trusted person to have fun with. This can make a huge difference to a family's quality of life, helping them to cope during the most difficult times they may face.

We are very excited to be able to respond to the increasing demand and are looking at ways to continue to develop and expand our services.

12% increase in demand for our services, supporting **674** new families

2,500 families were supported - the highest number ever

19% increase in volunteer hours directly supporting families

£4.6m raised by our generous supporters

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Rainbow Trust pairs each family with a dedicated expert Family Support Worker to help them face, and make the most of, each new day.

With our support, families have more time to do what they feel is most important when that time may be limited. Many services are withdrawn when a child dies but Rainbow Trust supports families for as long as is needed. 3

Families supported by Rainbow Trust are thrown into a world they never expected to be in, one they never imagined possible. The worry of their child's illness is overwhelming but parents do their best to keep life as normal as possible for brothers and sisters.

Hospital appointments may be miles away and often the family is split while one parent looks after the sick child and the other stays home with their other children.

Through all this, daily life goes on.

MEASURING OUR IMPACT

We want families to have control over the services we provide to empower them to make positive and sustainable changes in their lives.

We work in partnership with each family to measure how our support impacts their lives in six key areas. Families have identified the areas where they feel Rainbow Trust support can make the most difference.

These are:

Improved ability to manage stress

Increased stability and confidence

Better able to cope with grief and loss

Increased quality time with family

Improved quality of life

Improved economic wellbeing

Over 2,500 families supported

For example, if a family requests help with transport to hospital it could be because they are struggling to meet the cost of this (our intervention would lead to improved economic wellbeing), or it could be because the family finds the experience of having a seriously ill child overwhelming (our intervention could be linked to increased stability and confidence).

We create a support plan based on what each family tells us they need.

The following pages show the improvements felt by six families supported by Rainbow Trust as a result of our service.

HELPING FAMILIES MANAGE THEIR STRESS

Hope has Ebstein Anomaly. The right side of her heart is severely deformed so the left side of her heart has to work twice as hard to keep pumping oxygenated blood around her body.

Family Support Worker, Eleanor, supports the family at home and takes them to hospital appointments which means mum, Leanne, can focus on Hope. Eleanor can also look after Hope's brother, Tyler, at times which is a great relief for Leanne.

"At night we have to constantly check on both children - Tyler is asthmatic and we have to keep an eye on him too, so we don't get much restful sleep. When Eleanor takes the children out, I take a break and on many occasions have climbed into bed and slept. I know when the children are with Eleanor, they are safe. That break makes such a difference to my mindset and helps me feel as if I can continue. We don't know how much time we have with Hope so every ounce of strength is a blessing," said Leanne.

RESTORING STABILITY AND CONFIDENCE

Two-and-a-half-year-old Daniel was diagnosed with a rare cancer just days after Claire, his mum, found out she was pregnant with his sister. Sabrina, their Family Support Worker, helped with hospital appointments and would sit with Daniel to give his parents a break from the ward.

When Daniel was first diagnosed, I didn't want to talk to anyone or make friends with anyone. I felt if I left Daniel's room and spoke to other parents then this nightmare was real. With Sabrina's help, I built the confidence to make friends and now have a couple of mums who I speak to most weeks. They understand what we've been through and what it's like having a seriously ill child. I couldn't do without them now.

SUPPORTING FAMILIES WITH GRIEF AND LOSS

When one of Marie's five-year-old twin sons died from an aggressive brain tumour, her family's life was turned upside down. Dawn, their Family Support Worker, spent time with Liam, Jack's twin brother, making sure he understood what was happening.

Marie suffered from depression after Jack died and when she went back to work five months later, wasn't in a good place within herself. Dawn could see that she was struggling and finding life difficult. "She advised me that I needed to get help, which I knew but wouldn't have done anything about. Dawn came to the doctor with me and helped explain how I was feeling."

It was a relief to have Dawn with me because I wouldn't have done anything about my depression. I would have carried on regardless. **9**

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GIVING QUALITY

Megan was 12 when Adam, her eight-year-old brother, was diagnosed with a brain and spinal cancer.

Clare, their mum, naturally focused on getting Adam to hospital appointments for treatment and Megan had to move in with her grandparents as Clare couldn't take care of her while she was in hospital with Adam.

This separation from her mum and brother left Megan feeling isolated, not wanting to speak to her mum and burden her with any more worry.

Sibling Support Worker, Callie, helped Megan feel as if she wasn't alone. She gave Megan an outlet. She liaised with her school on Clare's behalf and helped Megan see her friends outside school.

Having this normality amidst the chaos helps children and families feel more comfortable with each other and find it easier to be together as a family.

IMPROVING FAMILIES' QUALITY OF LIFE

Noel, four, has severe development delay following a brain injury at birth and is on constant oxygen.

His condition has affected the whole family and, while his parents have done their best to give all three of their children what they need, it is often impossible to spread the attention when Noel requires round the clock care.

The family's quality of life has suffered as the priority is to get Noel to hospital appointments. Often, his parents are too tired to play games with Alexander, Noel's twin brother, and Abigail, their older sister, or arrange any family time together. Noel's dad and full time carer is constantly on hand for any difficulties that may arise. This means that spending time with Alexander and Abigail is often disrupted. With Brodie, their Family Support Worker's support, the family can relax and enjoy being together and have some fun, as there is enough attention to go round.

"The first thing Alexander asks on a Tuesday morning is whether Brodie is coming. It gives the kids a break, some attention because a lot of the time is spent around Noel because of his disabilities. Even on fun days out it revolves round Noel," said Darren, Noel's dad. Abigail, Brodie and Alexander

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When Brodie's here it's full on two hours of fun and games and it makes us happier. They are children and they are crying out for attention and Brodie provides that.

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
HELPING WITH FAMILIES' ECONOMIC WELLBEING

Grace was diagnosed with a brain tumour when she was 18 months old. The financial strain of having a child in hospital many miles away from home was crippling as her parents paid for transport to and from appointments. Fiona, Grace's mum, had to give up work to care for Grace which meant the family was relying on one salary. Darren, Grace's dad, was then made redundant so the family's income was reduced even further.

"Rainbow Trust's support helped us navigate the hospital experience which made a real difference when I was there on my own with Grace. Leanne's support with hospital trips meant we didn't have to spend hundreds of pounds we didn't have on getting her to her treatment," said Fiona, Grace's mum.

Leanne, our Family Support Worker, signposted us to different grants and benefits we were entitled to, having a seriously ill child.

Last year you raised an amazing £4.6m to fund expert Family Support Workers who supported over 2,500 families across the country.

CORPORATES

This year our amazing volunteers donated 25,539 hours of their time so that families we support could make the most of theirs. More than 357 volunteers gave their time in our shops, offices, out in the community, at our events and alongside our Family Support Workers.

EVENTS

Our amazing supporters climbed, ran, jumped, cycled, walked and swam to raise an incredible £590,000. Our 49-strong London Marathon team raised over £150,000 and a team from Lockton cycled from Cambridge to London raising over £20,000. 48 brave individuals walked across hot coals at Fire Walk London raising £12,000! Hanover Dairies arranged a ball and bike ride in aid of Rainbow Trust and raised £94,000.

Our loyal committees, friends and ambassadors joined us at our festive Carol Concert at St Paul's in Knightsbridge. This, along with Trust in Fashion and Corks & Couture at the Savoy and our World Cup event, meant the special events programme raised over £406,000.
